Open call for emerging women artists Theodora Niemeijer Prize 2016

From 11 January 2016 the registration for the third edition of the Theodora Niemeijer Prize dedicated to emerging women artists begins. Artists can submit a project proposal for Het Oog (The Eye), an oval shaped outdoor space in the Van Abbemuseum. The winner will receive a prize to the value of €10.000 and is offered the opportunity to realise her project from September this year.

The Theodora Niemeijer Prize was introduced in 2012 by the Stichting Niemeijer Fonds and the Van Abbemuseum because women are still a minority in exhibitions and museum collections. The prize is awarded once every two years to an artist living and working in the Netherlands who graduated at most five years ago. It is the only Dutch prize for visual arts dedicated specifically to women artists. The period for submitting project proposals starts on 11 January and runs to 1 May 2016. A jury of experts will examine the proposals will announce the winner end of June / early July. From September 2016 the artist can use Het Oog for six months as a platform for the project. The public then has the opportunity to see a work of art being created, and can be introduced to the artist and her practice.

Criteria for entry

Entrants for the Theodora Niemeijer Prize need to comply with the following criteria:

- Female visual artist;
- Living and working in the Netherlands;
- Graduated at most 5 years ago;
- Available between end of September 2016 and end of March 2017 to realise the project.

In addition, the following guidelines apply for selection:

- The project takes into account the special characteristics of Het Oog: an outside space which is visible from the museum, but also (partly) from public space. The space is accessible to visitors.
- Preference is given to projects which have a performance element or where the creative process is visible to visitors in the space.

Registration

Entrants can submit a project proposal, together with a CV, and a budget via theodoraniemeijerprijs@vanabbemuseum.nl.

Previous winners

In 2016, the Theodora Niemeijer Prize will be awarded for the third time. Previous winners were Sachi Myachi in 2014 and Sarah van Sonsbeeck in 2012.

Theodora Niemeijer Prize

The Theodora Niemeijer Prize is a tribute to Theodora Niemeijer (1912 -2004), the daughter of the well-known tobacco producer Niemeijer in Groningen. She was a very special character with a passion for the visual arts. In 1996 she established her own foundation with the aim of encouraging young artists. She died in 2004, but the Stichting Niemeijer Fonds still exists.

In 2012 the Niemeijer Fonds Foundation adopted Het Oog which allows the museum to carry out two projects a year in this space. In addition, the Theodora Niemeijer Prize was introduced.
